



MOSCUTO COAST - "Nicaragua is two countries—the Pacific and the Atlantic." It is widely said and the nation's eastern wilderness remains a world apart from cities and modern development of the western coast. These heavily forested tropical lowlands, stretching well into eastern Honduras, were never colonized by Spain but were instead reserved by Britain in 1627 as the Mosquito Kingdom at the request of Miskito Indian leaders. Their "kings" were crowned with the pomp in the Protestant Cathedral at Bluefields. Legacies of this great offshore empire still in the architecture, the wide spread use of English and the presence of many black Creoles originally brought over from the Caribbean Islands. During the Civil War, Lincoln officers of the newly-independent black is a remnant of their own in eastern Nicaragua. The proposal was rejected.
